We are pleased that you have expressed an interest in attending The Guild School by applying for one of our scholarships. The Guild School, sponsored by the International Guild of Miniature Artisans (IGMA), established its Scholarship Program in 1985 with the first scholarship recipients attending the 1986 Guild School. Each year since then, scholarships have been awarded to deserving miniaturists.

A full-tuition scholarship is currently valued at \$1600 and pays for 36 hours of instruction plus room and board for the entire school week. Recipients must provide their own transportation and assume any other expenses incurred such as materials fees for classes (typically \$20-\$300) and evening seminars (typically 0-\$50).

The source of funding for the Scholarship Program comes from various fundraising efforts held during the school week. The major event is the Live Auction.

Needless to say, the scholarship provides a wonderful opportunity for individuals who appreciate, and wish to learn more about creating, fine miniatures. Through the Scholarship Program, The Guild School can quite possibly become a reality for you...a friend...or a relative.

SOME THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW:

Applicants must be at least 18 years of age. Applicants need not be members of IGMA.

Applicants may not be an IGMA board member or employee of the Guild.

Applicants do not have to live in the U.S., nor be citizens of the U.S.

The International Guild of Miniature Artisans is committed to the perpetuation and improvement of miniatures. Scholarships are primarily intended to make the Guild School experience available to students who might otherwise not be able to attend due to financial constraints. Scholarship applicants are evaluated on how their attendance at the Guild School could potentially contribute to:

- 1) the furtherance of miniatures as an art form and the raising of standards (including, but not limited to - adherence to scale and proportions, historical accuracy, etc.) in the creation of miniatures;
- 2) the quality of the applicant's work and the degree to which the curriculum offered by the school would expand or enhance the applicant's skills and areas of interest;
- 3) the dissemination of knowledge, enthusiasm, and skills to miniaturists within a local context, as well as around the world, by teaching, writing, exhibiting or other forms of sharing, both past and in the future;
- 4) the degree to which the applicant needs financial assistance for school expenses and how important attending the Guild School would be to them (fiscal priorities).

Applications in a given year will be ranked against the above criteria by the Scholarship Committee. The Guild School Director will determine the number of scholarships that can be supported in that year. That number of the top ranked applicants will be awarded a scholarship.

SUBMISSIONS

Via Mail: Six (6) copies of your application and all supporting materials (including 6 copies of each photo) are to be submitted. They will not be returned. This permits the evaluation process to go on in parallel, with all committee members evaluating your application at the same time.

Via Email: You may scan the completed application and recommendation form and send it in PDF format (ONLY) via email to the committee chairperson. You may also send one copy of each photo via email in JPG format. Photos need to be sent in a small, screen-viewing format – low resolution (72 dots per inch/dpi) and no bigger than 6”. Please send all email documents at the same time.

PHOTOGRAPHS

Not more than eight (8) photographs of your miniature work, within the last three years, **must be included with this application.** Please include with each photo: your name, address, a short description, date of completion, and scale. Indicate if the piece is your design, or worked from someone else’s plan. **Do not include class projects or pieces made from a kit.** It is preferable to submit close-ups of individual pieces so that the committee can examine the craftsmanship that went into your work. If you submit photos of room settings, please be sure to indicate which pieces are your own work. Do not submit binders/notebooks/photo albums/books. **PLEASE REMEMBER THAT A GOOD QUALITY COLOR PHOTO ENABLES THE COMMITTEE TO BETTER EVALUATE YOUR WORK AND POTENTIAL.**

RECOMMENDATION

Ask someone, who is familiar with your work and your involvement with miniatures, to fill out the enclosed Recommendation Form. Please send no more than three references. Remind your reference that the form must be returned no later than August 1st.

- ✓ Make up six (6) sets of copies of all of the material to be submitted, if mailing by post
- ✓ Postmark or post electronically by August 1st
